NEW Working Together to Safeguard Children 2023

The Government has now published the revised version of Working Together to Safeguard Children following the consultation. I've created the video below to help you understand the changes.

Key points

- No statutory roles or functions have been removed
- Increased emphasis on multi-agency working
- Changes to law included, for example, Domestic Violence Act 2021
- Greater emphasis on extra-familial harms and exploitation
- Sets out what a good assessment (report) might include
- Useful annex of resources

Reader Survey Results - December 2023

'A good DSL is like a good bottle of wine - gets better with age!'

Just one reply from our reader survey!

Thank you so much for taking the time to complete the Reader Survey before Christmas. It was so supportive to have the many responses that came.

Your thoughts will really help shape the Safeguarding Briefing and other work going into the New Year and beyond.

Who reads the Safeguarding Briefing?

Although I set up the Safeguarding Briefing to support DSLs in schools, I found it really reassuring that although many of you are not DSLs, but find the content helpful in your role. Whilst I feel that I should stay focussed on the needs of DSLs, I will aim to include some broader content too from time to time.

Community

A lovely response in the survey, was how many of you felt that the briefing gave a sense of community united by the desire to make a real difference to the lives of children and young people.

Replies included:

'makes me feel like I'm part of a team'

'I feel part of a community of DSLs'

'I feel less isolated'

'I feel part of a shared endeavour'

A large number of people said that they would like to be able to communicate with other DSLs.

An online community is fairly easy to set up, for example, it could be set up for free in Facebook. However, as the subject matter would be around safeguarding and schools, I think it would be essential to have an audit

trail and moderation on any platform we used. As far as I'm aware, these features aren't available on a free platform, so if we set up online forum using an app, there would be cost implication.

The forum would also need a few people to volunteer to be moderators/admins of the group. If that sounds like something you'd be interested in doing, please let me know.

What keeps DSLs busy?

The most frequent answers here referred to (in no particular order):

poor mental health (including increasing in eating disorders, increasingly seen in boys; and self-harm)

Neglect

Poverty

Dealing with acrimonious parental separations

Harmful Sexual Behaviour between learners

Emotionally-based School Avoidance

Domestic Abuse

What are the biggest challenges?

It will be no surprise to you that the key challenges for DSL are:

Insufficient time to deal with the workload

Lack of support capacity in other agencies

Increasing expectations on schools

Supervision

About a third of the DSLs who answered the survey said they had regular supervision; another third had supervision occasionally; and the other third said they wanted the opportunity. You will remember that I asked you to grade your stress level. This was not a scientific survey by any measure, but it did seem that people who had supervision reported slightly less stress.

As you may know, I offer supervision training and this might help more people access supervision.

Open courses and events

Although I work with schools and other organisations at their own premises and venues, I haven't offered any open courses for a few years. The reader survey showed that you would again welcome the opportunity to attend events and so I will be offering some of those again.

Online Consultancy Calls

One really good idea that came up a number of times was the ability to book an online time to access support and advice from me. This is fairly easy to set up and trial, so I'll share a link for that probably next week.

For various reasons, any consultancy I offered online would be around the implementation of safeguarding strategies and protocols in an organisation and it would not be possible to comment on individual pupil (or staff) cases.

Best tips for DSLs

The final question in the reader survey asked for the best tip you were given to meet the needs of your role. There were some brilliant and really helpful comments shared in these answers, and I'll share these with you over the next few weeks.

Weekly question?

One finding that came out of the reader survey was how many of you use the briefing as a starter for your staff meetings. Someone suggested there could be a 'Question of the Week'. Are you able to help write these?
